Leader:

AII:

What must we do to prepare the way? What must we do to prepare for the coming of the Lord?

Leader:

The people of God longed and prayed for the Messiah – the Saviour, the Hope, promised by I saiah. They waited in hope for 700 years. Then the voice of John the Baptist was heard:

John:

"The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit.' (Mark 1:7-8)

AII:

What must we do to prepare for his coming? (pause for silence)

John the Baptist answered the people and said:

John:

"In reply he said to them, 'Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do like wise." (Luke 3:11)
