10.2 Student Services September 2024 Recap and updates

Mental health Services:

MH provided inservices to gr 7 - 8 teachers on mandatory lessons, gr 10 careers teachers on new mandatory mh lessons, gr 9 religion teachers on student mh literacy lessons. Mental health workers are in schools delivering a new 3 part all about anxiety workshop using inside out characters and confident me workshops to spec ed classes. Two mental health workers are focusing on home instruction students this year to provide services and work towards a return to school. Oct 10 marked World Mental Health Day- we were excited to host our staff and student mental health ambassadors to a leadership day where they spent half the day planning mental health initiatives for their schools and half day at Copperwood Trail Farm

Where they interacted with horses and worked on their leadership skills.

This was a busy start to the year as the ABA and Behaviour Resource departments worked to support Joint Health and Safety Initiatives through their systemwide in-person delivery of BMS Practitioner training. As of today's PA day, approximately 215 additional Education Workers will have received their updated certification. This effort is further supported at the school level through the ongoing and timely response by these departments to support student-specific needs through the development of individualized BMS Safety Plans, Positive Behaviour Support Plans, and behaviour consultation/training.

Amidst all of this, Behaviour Resource Workers still managed to deliver workshops to 50+ classrooms targeting topics ranging from friendship to cyberbullying to anger management and worked to support student's understanding of stress and how to cope.

September and October also marked the return of the ever popular Classwide Peer Acceptance workshops. Over the past month, the ABA Services department (which consists of just 6 team members) delivered in-class workshops to 43 different Elementary and Secondary Classrooms in schools across the Board. Students participated in classroom discussions and hands-on activities that were tailored for their specific classroom and aimed at empathy and acceptance for those peers who experience the world differently.

Last but not least, we are so pleased to share a joint initiative by Behaviour Resource and Mental Health Services who are partnering with Safe Schools to help educators and school staff refresh their knowledge about vaping and to plan for supportive, empowering conversations with their students to support their quit efforts. As part of today's PA Day, student services created a self-directed module that was accessed by Educators, entitled "Enhancing Mental Health Literacy and Building a Vape-Free Environment." Educators received information to build awareness about the contents of the new mental health literacy modules from the ministry along with real-world strategies and brief intervention skills to apply in their interactions with youth who vape. Educators will have also learned how they can support students to use stress management strategies and build knowledge about supports at school, in the community and online and how to help students access the support should they need it.

Occupational & Physical Therapy Services:

Continue to support schools with health management plans and personal care plans for toileting including training where applicable.

Continue to assess and procure equipment through the SEA (Special Equipment Allocation) fund or to ensure students' safety and access to curriculum.

Have received over 650 referrals for OT Services since the beginning of the school year.

Elementary Special Education:

In June Student Services purchased Writing A-Z licenses for elementary Special education teachers using a Ministry of Education TPA for Literacy.

Writing A-Z is a digital K-5 writing program that can be used as a compliment to any core literacy plan. It aligns with the Science of Reading, provides explicit systematics lessons and materials that focus on opinion, informative and narrative writing. Additionally, it includes grammar lessons and explicit lessons related to the process of writing.

It lends itself well to differentiated instruction as it provides various entry points for learners. It also includes graphic organizers, rubrics and editing checklists at various levels to foster inclusion for all students in the classroom within each writing task. As of today 70 schools are currently using the licenses.

Another digital platform being implemented by our Elementary Special Education teachers is Lexia Power up. Lexia provides students with a blended learning model where students are provided skill development through the online program to close some gaps for language learning. At this time in Elementary we are currently supporting grade 7&8 learners who are receiving core support related to literacy. We delivered a Lexia workshop this past month for teachers new to Core, and continue to provide Lexia refreshers for those who have already been trained and may need ongoing support. So far this year, teachers have requested 506 licenses for students in grade 7 and 8.

Secondary Special Education:

Planning is well underway for our new secondary project funded by the MOE through the *Removing Barriers for Students with Disabilities grant.* YCDSB will be using this grant money to focus on building a new YCDSB Transition Strategy. As we begin to develop this strategy to support students with disabilities transitioning to a post-secondary destination we look forward to leveraging our existing partnerships with specialized community support services and educational institutions to create transitional tools and resources for our students with special needs who are preparing to exit the educational system. We intend to provide transition training to our staff, students and parents to better prepare students for their post-secondary pathway.YCDSB will collaborate with York Support Services Network (YSSN) to build transitional support resources for our students with special education needs in York Region. Their specialized knowledge and support services are uniquely positioned to help bridge families to the supports they need for their young adults in high school and beyond. We will certainly keep SEAC updated throughout the year.
