
Land Acknowledgement:



8.1 Fit body, fit mind summer camp

The Fit Body, Fit Mind camp, held over one week, was a joint effort between Occupational Therapy and Mental Health Services, aimed at students with physical disabilities in Grades 4-8 who could direct their own care. Funded by the MOE Summer Learning, the camp provided a mix of structured activities and flexible choices to enhance physical and mental health, self-esteem, and social connections while addressing anxiety and body image issues.

Program Highlights:

Activities like rock climbing, floor hockey, and arts/crafts promoted teamwork, problem-solving, and sensory/motor skills development.

Gross motor activities improved strength, coordination, and stamina.

Students reported greater social engagement, confidence, and a sense of belonging.

Parents appreciated the camp's inclusive approach and its positive impact on their children's social skills and confidence. Transportation played a key role in its success. The camp's ability to foster an inclusive, supportive environment highlights the importance of continued investment in such programs.

This program bridges classroom learning with real-world experience. Through mentorship from staff and supervision by an OTA, neurodiverse students gain hands-on skills in trades settings. The co-op model helps them explore career paths, build confidence, and develop essential work habits. Ongoing communication with co-op teachers ensures that the experience is supportive, structured, and aligned with both student and workplace goals.

REPORT TO SEAC, OCTOBER 2025

A formal announcement was made by the Ontario government on September 29, 2025 regarding its commitment to protect the provincial health care system by making it faster and easier for young people to connect to mental health and substance use support. As Lead Agency, York Hills Centre for Children, Youth and Families is pleased to host one of 10 new hubs in Ontario and the first youth wellness hub in Vaughan. York Hills led the co-design of the Maple Youth Wellness Hub with local community partners including 360°kids, Canadian Mental Health Association (CMHA) York Region & South Simcoe, and Addiction Services Central Ontario (ASCO), ensuring diverse youth voices were at the centre of the design of the hub model. We worked closely with our Youth Advisory Council to help shape a space that truly puts youth at the centre of services that reflect the real needs of young people in York Region.

The **new hub offers free, walk-in services for youth aged 12 to 25**, services include mental health and substance use support, primary care, peer support and social services. Additional services offered through the hub include supports for newcomers, employment services and access to community and social supports – under one roof. **Maple YWHO is located at 9401 Jane Street, Suite 321, Maple, On L6A 4H7**. Special Education Advisory Committee Association Update

Association: Easter Seals Ontario

Key Updates

- Easter Seals Ontario has already committed over \$1.5M this year through our Equipment Funding Program, which funds orthotics, accessibility, mobility, communication, and bath/toileting aids not covered by ADP. While ADP covers 75% of some of these items (but 0% of all bath/toileting aids), the remaining 25% remains a substantial financial burden for many families especially when equipment such as pediatric power wheelchairs can cost between \$35-45K (family portion to be paid would be roughly \$8,750–\$11,250). Keep in mind that families must upgrade this equipment every time their child goes through a growth spurt!
- Over the past 2 months we have committed \$24K in scholarship and grant funding for adaptive school supplies to 21 students (through SunLife and ScotiaRise). We also renewed a partnership with Bruce Power to provide 5 of our post-secondary age clients with mentorships in their fields of study.
- We sent out a comprehensive Family Priorities in Special Education Survey to our client families. The purpose of this survey is to gather insight into the families' experiences in key areas of Spec Ed including: IEPs, IPRCs, accessibility, inclusion, and school support. - We also made a submission to the Ontario Auditor General's Office for their audit
 of special education in Ontario, via a PAAC on SEAC invitation, in which we
 identified key concerns raised by our clients and their families.
- Easter Seals Ontario will be supporting a PAAC on SEAC working group in the
 development of presentation materials that will be shared at the Chiefs of Ontario
 Education Team's 2025 Special Education Sharing Forum: "Empowering Futures

 Holistic Approaches to First Nations Special Education in Ontario" in
 November.
