8. PRESENTATION(S):

Curriculum Updates Presentations

Presented by Anthony Arcadi, Superintendent of Education: Curriculum and Assessment

A. <u>In servicing Update</u> Presented by: D. La Gamba - Coordinator of Elementary Programs & C. Mazzeo - Coordinator of Secondary Programs

The presentation focused on key areas of inservice delivery to teachers.

- a. The curriculum department is leveraging different modules to support professional learning on a continuum.
 - i. Ministry priorities are presented through PA Day inservices, central sessions/ pilots are where board initiatives are realized.
 - ii. Through SILCSAW the curriculum department supports schools through smart goals and board pillar goals.
 - iii. Small group PD is provided to support the request of teachers to address a variety of instructional assessment needs
 - iv. Job imbedded PD is a type of professional development that is tied to a teachers day to day needs and responsibilities.
- b. A curriculum listing of portfolios was presented with a focus on our pillar goals in numeracy and literacy.
- c. Inservicing with an emphasis on literacy included: Spark Reading K-5, Lexia Core5 (1) & PowerUp (9), Sankofa (7&8) with Science & Math connections and Concept Mapping (4-12). In a similar way emphasis on numeracy include: Math Leads K-12, STREAM Leads K-8 and EQAO Math Leads (9).
- d. YTD curriculum has offered 112 central in-services that incorporated 1833 participants. Of these 75% were in-person sessions and 25% were virtual.

B. Digital Math Tools (Diagnostic Tool) Presented by: R. Ball - Elementary Math Consultant M. Schniering - Secondary Math Consultant

The presentation focused on the new Math tool procured through ministry funding for digital math tools.

- a. The MOE provided a list of vendors/products and criteria for selection.
- b. YCDSB will be providing all K-8 teachers and 9-10 math teachers with Knowledgehook (a digital, formative assessment tool). Knowledgehook is aligned with the Ontario mathematics curriculums and will allow teachers to assign questions (based on specific curriculum expectations) for students to complete.
- c. The program will then determine if there are any gaps in student understanding and provide the teacher with suggested next steps (overview of the concept, common misconceptions, and remediation questions).
- d. As teachers assign questions to students on various concepts and skills, additional questions will unlock automatically for those who want to do extra practice on their own.
- e. Knowledgehook is expanding its platform and there are a few areas that are still in development (and can't be accessed at the time of writing).

Trustees of the board requested for further clarification in areas of the program modality, teacher intervention and an auditory possibility.

Trustee Wigston also requested data to support how many teachers are using the resource at a future Student Success and Pathways meeting. The trustees were satisfied with Consultant Ball's responses to all of their inquiries.

C. Religious Education:

Presented by: David Pimentel - Principal of Religious Education

The presentation on religious education emphasized upcoming activities and programs offered by the Catholic Education Center.

a. Catholic Education Week (May 1st-5th)

The Catholic Education Week Resource Package will be available to OCSTA Catholic Education website and shared throughout the System. The package includes elementary and secondary resources. For elementary, there is a Catholic education Week book list with titles and lesson plans for each sub theme of Cath Ed Week for each division, along with prayer services and guides for school wide experiences such as a Faith Play Day and a Living rosary. For the secondary panel, there are daily prayers, reflections, and suggested activities for each of the Catholic Education week subthemes and an outline for a one day school retreat.

b. Faith Ambassador Program

The Faith Ambassador program serves two main purposes, the first as the liaison at all of the respective schools for all faith-related matters and the second as our adult faith development facilitators and leaders. The Faith Ambassador chairs organized a board wide Advent retreat in December, and will be hosting two more Lenten retreats where mass will be celebrated followed by fellowship and a light dinner.

c. Religious Education Advisory Committee

REAC is an advisory committee with a broad range of representation of roles from YCDSB, including Bishop Boissonneau at the helm and parish, parent, and trustee representation, in addition to elementary and secondary administrators and teachers. At the beginning of each two-year cycle, there is a continuation of tasks within subcommittees or there is a brainstorming session to identify the concrete, real needs with consideration to YCDSB priorities and programming. Subcommittees are then formed to carry out the planning and development of a clear direction/action.

d. Luke 4:18 Symposium

The Luke 4:18 Symposium is taking place on Friday, May 26, 2023 at the CEC from 8:30-4:30 It is a fun and exciting day of team building, fellowship and reflection on social justice issues. Students from Grades 6 to 8 are eligible to participate, and are accompanied by teachers for the day. A morning and afternoon snack as well as lunch will be provided for each participant. Each school will have the opportunity to assist with a Symposium planning task. Vendors are also invited to the event, including our Catholic charitable agencies such as ShareLife. Thanks to the generosity of the Board of Trustees, there is **no fee** for participating in this year's Symposium.

e. Fully Alive Update

Pearson is ending its support for Fully Alive. In December 2022, they retired the remaining Fully Alive print materials, and the entire series is now out of print. Pearson will stop supporting the digital version of Fully Alive by March 24, 2023.

Though Pearson will be stepping away from supporting this series, all YCDSB will continue to have access to downloadable PDFs of Fully Alive student and teacher resources until March 24, 2023. The link to access the downloadable PDF's has been $\frac{4}{4}$ shared with the system in system memo 21: Ref **# C:282** The Institute for Catholic Education (ICE) will continue to house all the *Fully Alive* student and teacher PDFs, beyond the March 24th date. The Religious Education program, *Growing in Faith, Growing in Christ,* now has resources from Gr. 1-8, with the FDK version to be released in the fall of 2023, and the grade 9 program currently in consultation.

The trustees' generous sponsorship of the Luke 4:18 symposium, which will enable more kids to participate, was recognized and thanked by Superintendent Arcadi.

D. Pathways Updates

Presented by: M. Calabrese - SHSM Consultant D. Di Meo - SHSM Consultant

Consultant Di Meo and Calabrese presented on the SHSM programs. The Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM) is a unique curriculum that enables students to earn credits towards their Ontario Secondary School Diploma while simultaneously concentrating their learning on a particular economic area. The SHSM is a Ministry approved program. The program is offered to grade 11 & 12 students. Students receive a red seal on their diploma once they graduate. YCDSB offers 36 SHSM programs across 15 secondary schools, two of which are centralized programs. YCDSB is the only board to offer centralized programs.

The SHSM expansion was also made available by the ministry in an effort to boost opportunities in the skilled trades sector. St. Augustine, St. Theresa Lisieux, St. Max Kolbe and St. Robert were the successful applicants. These schools received extra funding from the ministry of education.

The Trustees Board members were impressed with the presentation's information and thanked the consultants for their diligent effort.

E. Con-Ed Department Programs

Presented by: C. De Haas - Principal, Elementary Programs, Continuing Education A. Pasquini - Principal, Secondary Programs, Continuing Education

The presentation highlighted the following areas:

- a. Marketing The After School, Evening, Weekend and Summer Programs through social media pages on Twitter and Instagram. Currently these social media apps have 700 followers.
- b. Remote offerings enable market of programs beyond the YCDSB community. YCDSB is a leader in offering remote options for both elementary and secondary students and has also recently launched a Adult General Interest Conversation Program.
- c.The International Languages Program (ILP) offers 18 different languages. Different languages are introduced by language and location requests based on student interest and enrolment.
- d. Currently, there are over 3500 students involved in evening and Saturday Elementary International Languages.
- e. Several community partnerships have been established including the Portuguese Consulate, Markham Tamil Community Group, Our Lady Queen of Poland Parish Community and Italian Contemporary Film Festival.

- f. The General Interest programming includes programming with a fee for service. The offerings have expanded to include Cooking and Crafts, Woodworking, Badminton, Art and French programming.
- g. In the secondary panel, almost 500 students are working towards earning an International Language credit. After school non-credit and credit remedial programs in math and literacy, including Homework Helper are offered at our secondary schools. Credit courses are offered in night and summer school and are very popular with both our students and students outside the YCDSB.
- h. Some of the after school secondary programs that are being offered are: Yearbook, Drumline and the High-Performance Athlete credit.
- i. Adult General Interest On January 30th YCDSB launched Conversational International Language in French and Italian.

Trustees of the board had an opportunity to seek clarification on the partnerships that Con-Ed has established. The presentation was well received by the trustees.

Roots of Empathy

An international, evidence-based classroom programme called Roots of Empathy has proven a significant impact in lowering the aggression levels of pupils by boosting their social/emotional skills and promoting empathy. Children aged 5 to 13 are intended for the programme.

Superintendent Arcadi informed the board of trustees that the curriculum department is currently Working in partnership with the student services department in executing a pilot programme with Roots of Empathy and expressed that a more fulsome report around this pilot will be forthcoming.

Music/ Arts Report

The board of trustees requested a data analysis of the music programme offered at Father Michael McGivney. Trustee Alexandre suggested that further analysis would help to determine if the schools with low music/ arts enrollment could be combined to offer different instrument choices. Trustee Wigston also requested the numbers of sections for digital art and dance programmes. Superintendent Arcadi clarified that the numbers combined both digital and traditional programmes. Director Scuglia also commented that the programmes run dependent on the student enrollment.

METHODOLOGY: How We Explored Our Curiosities

We explored the curiosities that we had about the impact of the STREAM Centres of Excellence using the following methodologies:

Google Form Surveys

Completed by classroom teachers following each STREAM Centre of Excellence visit.

Sample size: 230 submissions

Student Drawings & Open-Ended Questions

Students completed drawings and answered open-ended questions about their STREAM Centre experiences.

Sample size: 922 submissions across all six STREAM Centres

Focus Group Interviews

Student focus groups and teacher interviews were conducted for each STREAM Centre location.

Sample size: 29 students (across six focus groups) and 6 individual teachers

FINDING:

Participating in the STREAM Centre experience has positively impacted educators' understandings of STREAM.

"It's students being able to create, and create out of the box and outside of a textbook, so it's hands on. It's a problem. It's something innovative that they have to solve by working together" (Classroom Teacher).

UNDERSTANDINGS OF STREAM



Common themes beyond acronym:

problem solving, collaboration, empathy, hands-on learning, thinking outside the box, rooted in curriculum.

FINDING:

Participating in the STREAM Centre experience has positively impacted educators' comfort and confidence around STREAM.

"I feel much more comfortable from having been there and experiencing it. I feel more confident that it is something that I can actually do. Before it seemed like it was unattainable, that it was just something that I would have to take my kids to. Somebody else has to lead it, somebody else has to do it and I will just help. But no, after being there and seeing it, it is something that I can do and take into my classroom" (Classroom Teacher).

EFFICACY WITH STREAM



Common themes: confidence in engaging in STREAM-related practices and comfort in promoting student agency.

FINDING:

While participating in STREAM Centre activities, high student engagement was observed by educators.

"They loved the experience of just going there. It was really exciting for them to take a bus and to be in a different building. Right from the very beginning, having the whiteboard tables to write on and to brainstorm their ideas together, they really felt that it was something special that they were invited to, that they could be fully a part of" (Classroom Teacher).

FINDING:

Participating in the STREAM Centre experience has positively impacted students' understanding of the value of STREAM.

"Well Jesus, we all know because we're Catholic, we follow His footsteps and we try to do what is best for our community...So I feel when we're at the STREAM Centre, we got to do the same sort of thing and we got to really learn and experience what it's like to just put others in front of us and follow really important footsteps that Jesus was creating for us. We got taught how to help the community and our world with just a couple pieces of Lego" (Grade 6 student).

FINDING:

Students identified that working with technology and materials that they don't typically have access to as the most 'fun' aspect of the experience.

"I liked how we got to use things that we don't get to use in the everyday classroom, like we got to use the Lego to code. This is something we don't get to do every day, it was something new" (Grade 6 student).





That's not like anything we have here" (Classroom Teacher).





"STREAM showed me the importance of collaboration. The STREAM activities were all based on collaborating with others to solve the problem. The way you are able to get different points of view, different perspectives, and you can share ideas. So just that alone inspired me to continue to use STREAM knowledge and experience in my methods of teaching" (Classroom Teacher).

FINDING:

Recurring words mirrored findings from student drawings and interviews about technology, materials and working with others.

"...I really love hands on learning, and I feel I do better when I do hands on learning then when I sit at a desk and read from a textbook" (Grade 8 student).

FINDING:

Educators most commonly identified the following elements of the STREAM Centre experience that they have transferred into their own classroom practice.

"We've been using empathy, that would be to make sure that students put themselves in another person's shoes when coming up with a solution. I found that was very empowering and we have been using that, my students actually use empathy all the time now" (Classroom Teacher).

FINDING:

Students most commonly identified the following skills from the STREAM Centre experience that have supported them beyond their visit.

"I think with coding, I was really bad at it before I went to the STREAM Centre. And now, even at home, I've started to do it a lot more, and I just feel like that's really helped me and it's going to help me in the future" (Grade 8 student).

MOST TRANSFERABLE SKILLS

Increased confidence in coding

Increased knowledge in how to approach problem solving

Persevering through challenges and mistakes

Limitation: Lack of school resources

FINDING:

Both educators and students prefer to visit the STREAM Centres with greater frequency.

"I would like to go once or twice a year. But like I think it's really good to go more often because it's teaching us to solve problems in a very fun way. So like, it's something that we want to learn more about and we enjoy and we want to go often and learn more skills" (Grade 6 student).

FREQUENCY OF STREAM CENTRE VISITS



Common themes: once a month, once a year, twice a year, as often as possible.

TAKEAWAYS:

- Data has demonstrated that our STREAM vision, as it relates to both students and educators, is being effectively carried out.
- Data demonstrates the importance of continuing the practice of providing planning resources for educators (pre and post lessons) to continue the momentum when it comes to educators' understandings, confidence and comfort around STREAM.
- Data demonstrates the importance of continuing the practice of providing cutting edge technology, hands-on resources and opportunities for collaboration for students.
- The data indicates that we need to inspire continued excitement and interest despite perceived barriers.

- This would invite the student to think about what the question is asking vs. applying the knowledge they had just acquired (as is the case with **EQAO** testing)
- Introduction of Knowledgehook, which highlighted the available EQAO questions within the platform for grades 3 and 6
- Showcased the similarities between Knowledgehook as a digital platform and EQAO as a digital assessment

- The government is providing an additional \$3.3 million over the next three years, beginning in 2023–24, to expand access to dual credit opportunities in health care-related courses for an additional 1,400 secondary students.
- The Ministry will be focused on dual credits for health care related courses. Health related program funding is available in: Nursing, Personal Support Worker, Paramedic, Medical Lab Technician or introductory health care courses
